c. Washoe Valley Consolidated Station.


I have met with the Porter Group and requested a proposal to retain them. The Porter Group specializes in securing federal money for projects. 2. Spanish Language Outreach

To expand our public outreach and risk reduction education, we are continuing our communication outreach to the Spanish-speaking population through social media and the local Spanish-speaking media. Throughout November and December, we performed multiple media interviews with our Spanish-speaking media outlets on holiday fire prevention topics. One of our newest fire prevention inspectors is fluent in Spanish and communicates effectively in Spanish. We continue to build upon our Spanish-speaking social media platforms.

Spatial Reference Datum: WGS 1984 The year 2024 will long be remembered as one of the most significant wildfire seasons in our fire district's history. Multiple large-scale wildfires ignited across various jurisdictions, stretching resources and testing our community's resilience, firefighters, and partnerships with neighboring agencies. Despite the immense challenges, it was also a year that highlighted the strength of collaboration, the importance of preparation, and the hard work of front-line firefighters.

Challenging conditions, including erratic winds and dryness, caused wildfires to ignite and rapidly spread on multiple occasions. Our district faced several significant fires, each threatening lives, hundreds of homes, and critical infrastructure.

The most significant fire, the Davis Fire, had the potential to burn through hundreds of homes. The Fire Behavior Analyst (FBAN), supported by computer modeling, warned of severe fire behavior, and the NWS issued a rare PDS (Particularly Dangerous Situation).

The FBAN predicted possible fire spread through Arrowcreek and into Reno to the McCarran loop. On the day of that model, sustained 50 mph winds occurred. However, that prediction did not manifest because area firefighters diligently worked to strengthen containment lines.

Interagency cooperation was pivotal. Command structures and mutual aid agreements allowed us to deploy significant resources and personnel and maximize effectiveness. Firefighters from different jurisdictions worked side by side, demonstrating the power of interagency cooperation
