

Washoe County Camping Ordinance (50.400): Enforcement, Impact, and Balance

Ordinance Overview

Prohibits 'camping' on county property/public places (incl. 1,000 ft of Truckee River) unless permitted

- •Camping = Sleeping/prep, storing belongings >48 hrs (abandoned after notice), tents/shelters/vehicles.
- •Exceptions: Medical emergencies, disabilities, permitted events.
- •Enforcement: Requires law enforcement to provide a warning or Written Posting first.
- Penalty: Misdemeanor.



No Camping

The Controversy – Voices on Both Sides

"A tool for law enforcement and service providers." vs. "Victimizes vulnerable population."

Supporters

- Enables services and cleanups
- Protects public spaces (e.g., neighborhoods impacted by trash/debris).

Opponents

 Risks criminalizing homelessness; seen as punishing poverty.

- •Passed 3-2 (March 26, 2024) after heated public comment.
- •Aligned with SCOTUS: Grants Pass v. Johnson (June 28, 2024) Upholds bans as not 'cruel/unusual'

Enforcement in Action – Stats Snapshot

Verbal →

Written Warning

--> Citation only if needed

• Formal Charges: 3 (June 2024 – Dec 2025)

Written Warning Citations: 40

 Verbal Warnings: Issued to virtually every person contacted under this ordinance (thousands of interactions)

HOPE Team Contacts: 4,529
 (repeat contacts common to build trust)

The Three Times the Ordinance Has Been Charged

All three charges occurred only after repeated warnings, offers of assistance, and/or additional criminal behavior.

- January 9, 2025 (Courthouse incident)
- Two individuals setting up camp on county courthouse grounds
- Resources offered & declined; one subject fled into Truckee River,
- Leading to resisting & paraphernalia charges; camping violation secondary
- July 21, 2025 (North Hills Blvd)
- Individual cited after ignoring posted 48-hour notice
- HOPE Team had previously cleaned up three separate encampments created by this same individual
- Multiple nearby businesses had submitted service requests due to large amounts of trash/debris accumulating around the site
- Resources repeatedly offered & refused over the prior year

Why the Ordinance Is Necessary – Real Benefits

The Tools

- 48-hour notice → lawful cleanup of unoccupied/abandoned sites
- Legal authority to contact → opens door for HOPE Team engagement
- Progressive enforcement: verbal warning

 → written warning → charge only as last
 resort

Measurable Results

(June 5, 2024 – Dec 5, 2025)


- HOPE Team contacts: 4,529 (repeat contacts build trust)
- Individuals moved to stable housing: 262
- Individuals placed in transitional housing: 116
- Travel assistance for family reunification provided
- Abandoned encampment clean-ups: 56
- Debris/waste removed: 448 cubic yards

(≈ 45 large dump-truck loads removed from county land)

Conclusion – A Balanced Path Forward

Low enforcement + High outreach = Humane progress

Protects public while prioritizing aid.
