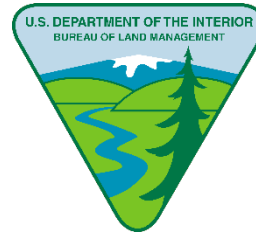

Fire Adapted Nevada (FAN) is a multi agency partnership involving federal, state, county and local agencies, non profit organizations and private entities. FAN's goal is to support communities as they become fire adapted.

We consider residents partners and active participants in creating Fire Adapted Communities (FAC's)

Prevention vs. Preparedness: Smokey vs. The Lorax.



For decades, communities have looked to two iconic voices to understand our relationship with fire and forests.

- **Smokey Bear** reminds us that *our actions can prevent wildfires*. His message is rooted in responsibility—campfire safety, debris burning rules, and making choices that keep unplanned fire from starting in the first place. Smokey stands for **Prevention**.

- **The Lorax** speaks for the forest and the communities within it. His message is about **Preparedness**—recognizing that wildfires *will* happen, and we must be ready. That means creating defensible space, hardening homes, building resilient landscapes, planning evacuation routes, and understanding how fire behaves.

- Together, these characters frame the full picture of fire adaptation:

Two legends walk into a forest.....

ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES!

Smokey has been incredibly effective—maybe a little *too* effective.

“The ‘Smokey Bear Effect’ taught generations to suppress all fire... which led to unnatural fuel buildup and the conditions we face today.

So today, we need more than prevention.

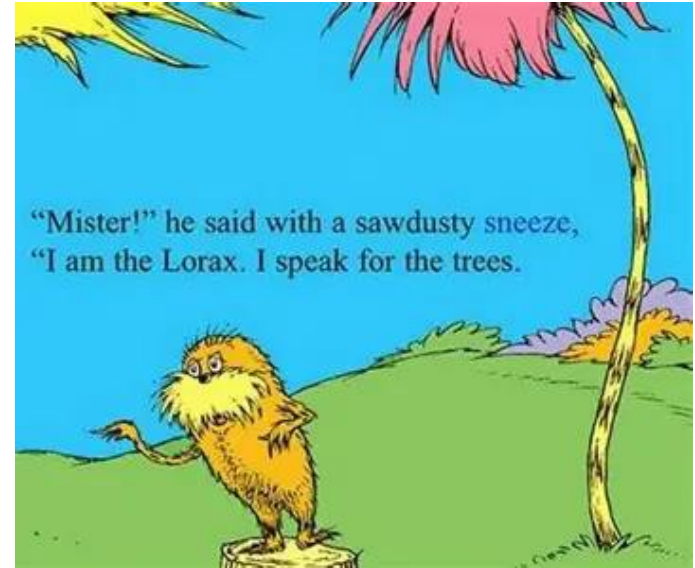
We need stewardship. Restoration. Shared responsibility.

Which brings us to another voice in forest health...



If **Smokey** reminds us to prevent disaster,
the **Lorax** reminds us to care for the landscape *before* it reaches that point

- Restore ecosystems, thin overcrowded stands.
- Support healthy fire and prescribed fire.
- Protect watersheds, wildlife habitat, and communities.
- Stewardship = long-term wildfire risk reduction
- Support thinning the ones that are too close to your home.
- Healthy forests need space, and so do you!

RISK

What can burn.
What we can lose.

THREAT

How likely a fire
is to start.

THREAT = likelihood. RISK = potential loss.
They are not the same thing.

A dynamic duo saving forests and communities one message at a time.



Smokey warns us about what *not* to do.

The Lorax encourages us toward what we *can* do.

Fire Adapted Nevada is the bridge between these messages.

We take Smokey's prevention, add the Lorax's stewardship, and turn it into real action—across communities, agencies, and landscapes

Reasons for Extreme Fire

- High temperatures (climate change)
- Record high winter precipitation
- Years of prolonged drought
- Fire season 105 days longer
- Low Relative Humidity (1%)
- Zephyr winds
- Development within the WUI (environmental change)





Lessons Learned

- Most damage/loss is caused by hazards in 0-5 foot zone

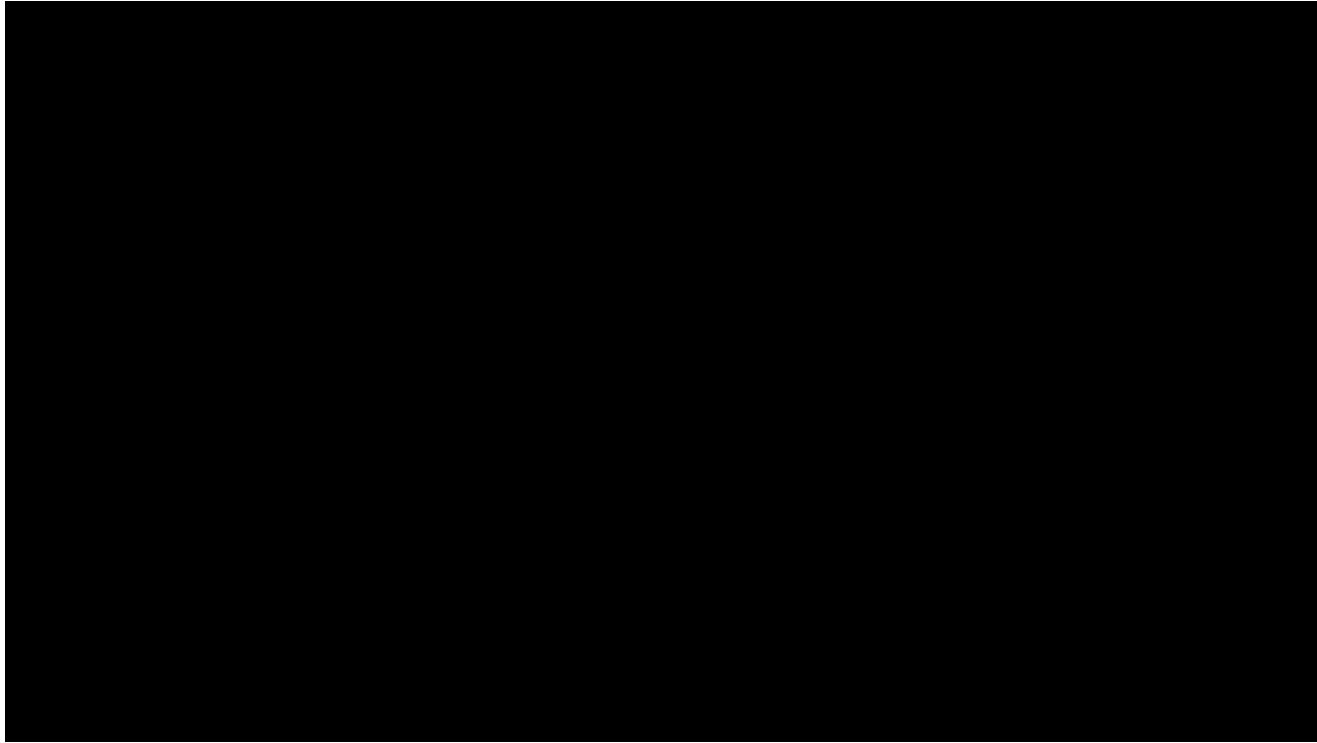

Wildfire Preparedness

A wildfire at full speed can grow an acre a second—and sometimes triple that. Wind-driven flames can move at 60 mph, overtaking roads that looked safe only moments earlier. At those speeds, escape or defense becomes impossible

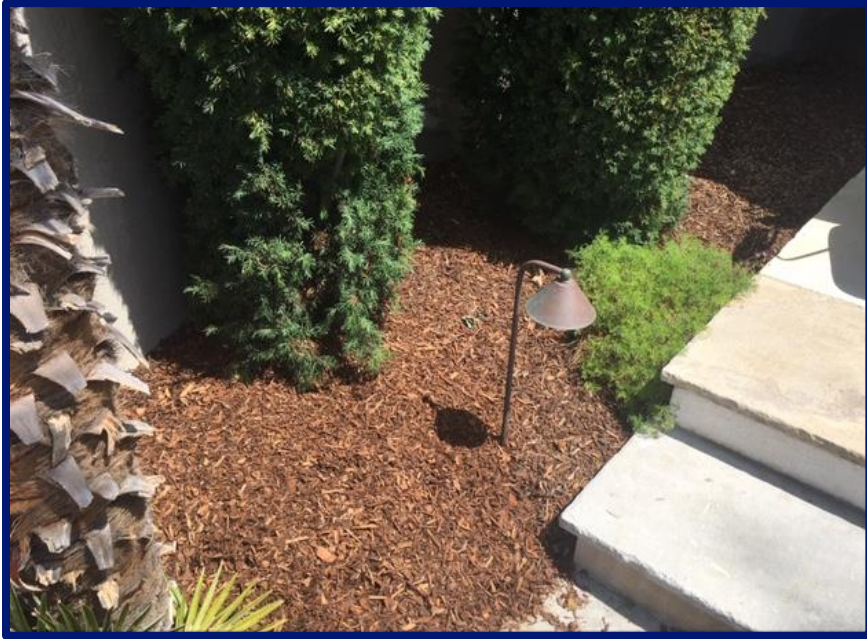
Wildfire Resiliency
